

Speaking of travel funds!

Our department, along with the Center for Greek Studies, is very generous in making awards for conference travel (for students who are presenting a paper) or research travel. Dr. April Spratley, whose dissertation was entitled "A Symphony of Genres: Musical Instruments, Intertextuality, and Genre in Ovid," received funds to attend a workshop in Italy on ancient musical instruments. She is holding a couple of the instruments she created.

What is the program like?

- We are the first and oldest Classics distance graduate program out there!
- Classes are held weekly LIVE online in Zoom in the Fall and Spring semesters.
 (No canned correspondence courses!)
- The Summer Latin Institute is held in-person on campus in July. The Master's program requires two SLI's, the Ph.D. program three. (\$750 travel scholarships available)
- UF no longer requires in-person attendance for 'final' or 'exit' exams (the oral exam for Master's students; the prospectus defense and dissertation defense for Ph.D. students). [These oral exams can now be held entirely or partially in Zoom.]
- Students move at their own pace, taking one or two seminars (or even three) per semester until exam prep time. About 2-3 years for Master's is average, 6-7 for Ph.D.

Pre-requisites for application?

- Current employment as teacher or other (e.g. librarian) at an accredited K-12 school or institution of higher education (doesn't have to be maintained throughout enrollment!)
- 2-3 years of college-level Latin at accredited institution of higher education
- Degree in Classics (or related field): Bachelor's for Master's applicants; Master's for Ph.D. applicants
- [What counts as a 'related field'? That is determined on a case-by-case basis, based on the Classics courses a student has taken, and the student's involvement in the field. For example, secondary education, with an emphasis on teaching Latin/Greek, should count.]
- What's NOT required any more? GRE scores!

Application deadlines

- Online Q & A with current students: Jan. 8
- Online Q & A with faculty: Jan. 22 (Faculty meeting REQUIRED for Ph.D. applicants, recommended for everyone)
- Take sight Latin translation exam, under supervision of a proctor: Fri.-Sat., Feb. 7-8 (pass/fail). Translate one prose and one poetry passage from standard authors, with a few parsing questions. Show sample exams now!
 - Proctor should be work colleague or supervisor; I'll need their name and email address to send them your exam, along with the day you'd like to take it, by Jan. 31.
 - You can either take the exam on a computer or ask your proctor to print it for you.
- UF receipt of application materials: Friday, March 7, 2025 (allow lots of time for transcripts to arrive!)
 - We'll try to get a decision to you by April 5 (seeing that Spring Break intervenes).

Application materials

- Follow instructions for UF Graduate Application (do NOT try to apply for 'online and distance learning programs'): https://admissions.ufl.edu/apply/graduate/
- Mark beginning term as SUMMER B 2024
- Letters of recommendation: 2-3 for Master's applicants, 3 for Ph.D. applicants (letters from colleagues or supervisors are OK)
 - You do not have to send me separate copies

Writing Sample

- Statement of Purpose serves as writing sample for Master's applicants
- Ph.D. applicants should submit a research paper or thesis chapter
- Transcripts from undergrad/grad institutions
 - These can take a while to process, so request them early! You can also send an unofficial transcript to expedite things in the meantime.

FAQ's

- Will this degree prepare me for a university-level Classics job?
 - No since our program does not require Ancient Greek. It is intended for the intellectual enrichment of high-school Latin teachers (primarily) who do not want to leave their homes/jobs to attend grad school.
- Is Ancient Greek offered?
 - The answer is 'yes', more and more often! Several on-campus Greek courses have offered a hybrid option for distance students. Dr. Kapparis taught Greek Prose Composition in the Spring, and Dr. Nichols is currently teaching a Greek literature survey course.
- How much will the program cost?
 - Tuition has been frozen for several years at about \$544 per credit hour (which is well below the cost of out-of-state tuition). The Master's degree (M.L.) requires 30 credit hours; the Ph.D. 60 credit hours, on top of 30 credits granted for the Master's degree (for a total of 90 credit hours). A seminar is 3 credit hours.
- Is Financial Aid available?
 - We offer only \$750 travel scholarships to help offset the cost of required travel to Gainesville. Students can apply to UF for financial aid, but that requires a student to take two courses per semester in the Fall and Spring.

Summer Latin Institute

- REQUIRED for all new students this is where you start the program.
- Held on-campus in July for 10 intensive days.
- Students really look forward to this as a chance to interact with their fellow students, who are other Latin teachers around the country, and meet faculty. I will hold F2F advising sessions too during this time.
- Optional research paper usually offered; highly recommended (so you can knock out 6 credits in the summer!)
- Plus, dinner at legendary Satchel's Pizza!
- SLI 2025: July 7-17 (topic and instructor TBA).
- SLI 2024: Dr. Victoria Pagàn taught Roman Historians (Sallust), July 8 July 18.

Program Requirements

- Master's (M.L.)
- The M.L. (Master of Latin) program does not require a thesis, but M.L. graduates can still apply to the Ph.D. program (with a significant writing sample).
- 30 credits total required; recommended breakdown is about 24 credits total of seminars before taking Independent Studies for exam prep.
- Latin Prose Composition required (offered every other year)
- Two (or more) Summer Latin Institutes
- Latin Reading List Exam (translate 3 of 4 passages at sight); at your location, supervised by proctor
- Roman History, Literature, and Culture Exam (3 of 5 essays); written part at your location, oral exam at UF or via Zoom

Program Requirements

- Ph.D. (Latin and Roman Studies)
- Latin Prose Composition required (offered every other year)
 - offered Fall 2024!
- 90 credits total required (incl. 30 transferred from Master's degree). Recommended breakdown is about 63 credits total of seminars before taking Independent Studies for exam prep and dissertation.
- Three (or more) Summer Latin Institutes
- Latin Reading List Exam (translate 4 of 6 passages at sight); at your location, supervised by proctor
- History of Latin Literature Exam (3 of 5 essays); at your location
- Special Topic Paper: 'pre-dissertation' prep
- Foreign Language Reading Exams: German, plus either Italian or French
- Dissertation Prospectus and Defense: at UF or via Zoom
